An interview with...

Mailynn Nguyen

12th grade, Stafford Site



1. Tell us about your work-based learning (WBL) experiences you have had while in high school.

In the summer after sophomore year, I asked the president of the regional Chamber of Commerce if I could help with data-related work, and she hired me after an interview. Since then, I've been able to create surveys, analyze my data, and use those data insights to inform Chamber events and outreach. The Chamber is unique because they represent the business community and also connect with schools and students to build the employment pipeline in our region. My data helped the Chamber realize that students in this area really want STEM internships, so we're encouraging businesses to be more open to hiring high schoolers for internships. We're proud to have connected nearly 100 students with internships at the Intern Expo last year! We're aiming to repeat that this year.

This past summer, I also started interning with the Capital Projects department in Stafford County government. I'm building geospatial (data + maps) skills way beyond what I learned in class while helping prioritize transportation projects to optimize safety and minimize traffic.

2. What is the most interesting thing you have learned from WBL?

On the technical side with Stafford County, I worked with VDOT crash datasets, created my own map data, and honed my Python skills through geospatial analysis.

Beyond that, I've also built "people skills," especially in my Chamber internship. There, I founded and continue to chair the Student Voice Subcommittee, which is a two-way street where student ambassadors get leadership experience and networking opportunities in the Chamber community while the Chamber hears direct student perspectives. (Accepting <u>applications</u> until Sept. 5!) Between Student Voice, panels, presentations, and even a radio interview, I've learned a lot about communication.

3. You have had some unique internship experiences so far in high school. What is some advice you may have for your fellow CGS students about career exploration?

Create your own opportunities based on what you're interested in because internships are your chance to figure out what you enjoy doing. Talk to people, email people: business owners, professors, anyone else who might have a gap you could fill. Taking initiative and taking that risk to create a job/internship for yourself is a great experience in itself, on top of the knowledge and skills you'll gain once you land a position.

4. What are your plans for after high school?

My Culminating project launched me into geospatial research with some conservationists in Madagascar, and the work we're doing involves all four of the disciplines I'm interested in—data science, geospatial tech, environmental science and economics—so I'd love to continue work like that during and after college.

5. In your spare time, what is something you like to do for fun or to relax?

I enjoy running cross country, hiking and (mostly) beating my family members at trivia.
